PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Criminal Justice introduces students to public safety occupations and what it takes to protect and serve a community. Practical instruction focuses on the daily duties of police officers and other professionals of the justice system. If you are interested in law enforcement, forensics, homeland security, conservation, or the legal proceedings of the criminal justice system, you should consider this project-based, hands-on program.

COURSE CONTENT

specialized classroom and practical experiences related to public safety occupations. The purposes, functions, and history of the three primary parts of the criminal justice system are introduced, as well as the investigative process. Oral and written communication skills are reinforced through public preparation of police reports. Other concepts include traffic control, forensic investigations at crime scenes, crash reconstructions using mathematical skills, collection and integrity of physical evidence, and questioning suspects. enforcement will also be covered. Simulator equipment may be used to demonstrate and train students on proper use-of-force procedures used in law enforcement.

WHEN YOU FINISH

Students who complete the Criminal Justice program go on to pursue careers in law enforcement, conservation, forensics, security, or criminal justice. Students continue their education at 2-year and 4-year colleges, join the military, or enter the workforce.
