Career Quest

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More than 50 6th and 7th graders explored career options at WCC's first Career Quest open house on October 11. Staff at WCC understand the significance of guiding students toward successful careers and believe that journey starts early. Students begin creating their high school schedule in the 8th grade, so 6th and 7th grade students were invited to help prepare them to create their schedule and include WCC.

At Career Quest, students and parents were able to:

Hands-on activities included working on the simulator in <u>Welding Technology</u>, creating monster characters in <u>Graphic Design</u>, fingerprinting in <u>Criminal Justice</u>, building boxes in <u>Construction Technology</u>, styling mannequins in <u>Cosmetology</u>, taking blood pressures in <u>Health Science</u>, decorating cupcakes in <u>Culinary Arts</u>, problem solving a scavenger hunt in <u>Education Careers</u>, using a spray gun in <u>Automotive Collision Technology</u>, cutting and engraving a metal key fob in <u>Precision Machine Technology</u>, and more.
